Fresh start planned for Colwood Corners

Colwood Corners is one of the City's most visible and significant sites. The 12.5 acre parcel on Sooke Road has the potential to bring new apartments, eateries, shops and services to Colwood.

The property was purchased in 2014 by Onni Group, a development company from Vancouver. The City received a development application from Onni in June 2016. Plans include commercial space and 284 rental housing units in buildings between one and six storeys high. The current London Drugs building remains in the plans.

Preserving our history as we build our future

Built in 1852 by the Hudson's Bay Company, the Colwood Dairy & Cheese House was the first dairy on Vancouver Island and is considered to be the oldest building on the West Shore. The proposed development in the 400-block of Goldstream Avenue would give the community new access to the historic Colwood Dairy & Cheese House by relocating it to the front of the property as the focal point of a new public park space.



What's building in Colwood

Colwood Corners, Sooke Road - The City is working through the new development application submitted by Onni Group.

Ocean Grove, Goldfinch Road - A development agreement is now in place for new housing and amenities including single family homes, townhouses, a park and a cafe in this lagoon neighbourhood.

Pacific Landing, Heatherbell Road - Construction has begun on the first phase, including three condominiums of between 3 and 4 stories each to provide 33 units.

Royal Bay, Latoria Boulevard - New homeowners are moving in, and two new parks will open this fall. Building permits have been issued for the Neighbourhood House and townhomes on Latoria Boulevard.

Ilaria Townhomes, Sooke Road - Four townhouse buildings are now under construction on Sooke Road to provide fourteen, three storey, contemporary west coast townhomes.

Painter & Metchosin - Construction is underway on nine single family homes and two 3-storey, 18-unit apartment buildings.

Centre for Well-being, Goldstream Ave -

Construction is underway on this Pacific Centre Family Services Association project.

468-474 Landmark, Goldstream Ave - A rezoning application is in process for 472 and 474 Goldstream. Plans include three apartment buildings for a total of 160 units, as well as a park that features the historic Colwood Dairy building. (See sidebar for more on the Dairy.)

Royal Bay Beachpark - new waterfront access

A new waterfront park operated by Royal Bay opened in Colwood on September 10th. The Royal Bay Beachpark features beach volleyball pits, landscaped areas, a bridge over the water channel, stairs down to the beach access, a small snack shack and washrooms. A children's play park will be installed this fall.

The park provides a new access point to Colwood's beautiful ocean beach, which stretches from Fisgard Lighthouse all the way to the Metchosin border and beyond.

The Royal Bay Beachpark is on Metchosin Road at Latoria Boulevard. While construction continues, the beachpark will be open Saturday & Sunday from dawn until dusk.

Metchosin Road improvements focus on safety

Preliminary designs have been developed for new sidewalks, bike lanes and a crosswalk on Metchosin Road between Lagoon Road and Hatley Drive. These improvements are intended to encourage drivers to slow down in this area, and are especially important for students and families who walk, cycle, bus or drive to Sangster Elementary and Dunsmuir Middle Schools.



The design includes new features such as:

- A raised concrete sidewalk on the Royal Bay Bakery side of the street.
- **Buffered bike lanes** along both sides of this section of Metchosin Road.
- A crosswalk near the transit stop at Dunsmuir Middle School.
- **Three islands;** one at the crosswalk near the transit stop, a second between Daniel Place and Hatley Drive and a third between Gratton and Cotlow Roads.

Protecting the Lagoon Pump Station

This past winter, Ocean Boulevard was closed on a couple of occasions when high tides and storm surges tossed water and debris onto the road.

Seawater also washed over the equipment at the lagoon pump station next to the washrooms at the waterfront. The pump station supports sewer service for homes in the Lagoon neighbourhood.

To protect the pump station this winter, the City will increase the size of the berm in front of it with additional rocks.

The long term plan is to relocate the pump station to a new location. Input from residents will be encouraged to assist Council in determining the new location.

There may be opportunities to include amenities such as artwork, a bandshell or other public space as part of the relocation. Get ready to share your ideas!

The new Painter Trail creates an artful connection

There's a new trail that links the Wishart neighbourhood to Royal Bay. It's especially helpful for students headed to Royal Bay Secondary, but also a great recreational trail that connects surrounding neighbourhoods to the new Meadow Park and down to the waterfront Beachpark.

The trail begins at the corner of Painter and Dressler Roads and meanders down through the sloped park area. It's designed at a 6% grade with lighting through the park to allow for safe use by people of all ages and levels of mobility.

Stop signs have been added at the intersection of Painter and Dressler Roads to allow for safer crossings to the trail.

Trees and plantings will be added through the fall, featuring fruit & nut trees and edible plants that will create a unique food forest.



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
